Nevada Living Will Lockbox

Nevadans can now use free electronic storage for living wills, do not resuscitate orders (DNR's), and other advance directives for end-of-life or emergency care in order to make those documents immediately available to health care providers. The new service, called the Nevada Living Will Lockbox was designed by the Nevada Secretary of State, whose office will maintain the electronic filing system. The Living Will Lockbox is a secure, web-based registry to which individuals can submit a living will or other advance directive documents to be electronically stored with password restricted access. Advance directive documents typically contain such information as limitations on treatment, type or level of care, and organ or tissue donor instructions.

Tom will demonstrate how you can access this FREE electronic storage tool and how you can set up your password-protected lockbox that can be retrieved by medical professionals only with your permission.

Tom's Tech-Notes

New PC for the SCSCC Classroom **Tom Burt, SCSCC Vice-President**

In late October, we installed a new Instructor desktop PC in the classroom. It's an interesting upgrade, so I thought I would share some of the details here. The PC is an **ASUS Essentio** that I bought from the Best Buy online store. Here are the key "out of the box" specifications:

- CPU - AMD A10-6700 (3.7 GHz quad-core) – including ATI graphics on-chip
- 8 GB of DDR 1600 RAM
- 1 TB SATA III 7200 RPM hard drive
- 6 USB 2 ports, 2 USB 3 ports
- Built-in Wireless 802.11ac network with antenna + Gigabit wired Ethernet + Bluetooth
- Operating System: Windows 8.1 Update 1
- Motherboard firmware: UEFI (Universal Extensible Firmware Interface)

I also bought a separate Samsung 840 EVO 250GB solid state drive, cloned the hard drive to it and installed it as the bootable C: drive. The hard drive is also present as drive D: and is used for persistent user data storage and for transient backups of the C: drive.

Installed software includes:

- Classic Shell, an open source tool that provides a Windows 7 style desktop start menu
- MS Office 2010 Professional
- Acronis True Image 2013
- Google Chrome and FireFox web browsers
- Image Tools: Picasa, Photoshop Elements 10, Photoshop CS 5, IrfanView, Paint.Net, GIMP, MS Photo Gallery, MS Paint
- Media Tools: iTunes 12, GoldWave, VLC Media Player
- Oracle Virtual Box - The SCSCC account desktop is set up with 3 Virtual Box virtual machines: Windows XP Pro (includes Office 2003), Windows 10 and LINUX Mint.
- A desktop Digital Clock Calendar program gadget, written by Tom Burt

The system is protected from permanent changes by Faronics Deep Freeze 8.10. Deep Freeze tracks and undoes any changes made to the PC when it reboots.

With the SSD and the fast quad-core CPU, the new PC easily outruns its predecessor by about 2 to 1 and it boots in about 20 seconds as opposed to several minutes.

While installing the Samsug SSD, I took a lot of photos and plan to reprise my "Upgrading to a Solid State Drive" seminar early next year to take account of how to do it with UEFI firmware.

Memories and Magic

Nowadays almost everyone has a scanner, but they don't know what it is or what it does, or what to use it for. Most people have a Multi-Function Printer which means, not only does this device print stuff, but it can also fax, make copies, and scan objects! What does "scan objects" mean? It means you can take a document (or a small flat object) and put it on top of the glass, press a button, and you have a digital image of that object. In my upcoming class, "*Memories and Magic*" being presented in the Computer Classroom on Monday, **November 3, at 1pm**, I will show you how to use your scanner and what to do with it.

The scanner can take a 100 year-old photo and make it a digital image. From this digital image, you can fix a bend or fold, touch up a scratch, adjust the color (if it's a color photo), and then preserve it for all posterity and share it with the rest of your family. Sharing this image is one of the most important things you can do so you ancestor's photos can be easily passed down from generation to generations! Fifty years ago, if you wanted to do something like this, you would have to find a professional and pay him a lot of money to do this for you, NOW, with a little knowledge, you can do this yourself, and it's really your moral obligation to your family to do this!

The scanner will also allow you to digitize important papers and documents, so that you will have them when you need them.

Have you ever gone to the Emergency Room, with pains or discomfort, and the first that is done is that you are asked many questions, that you now have to answer under duress. What a pain. When I go to the ER, I take my print out my Medical History and when I get to the hospital, I just give them the paper and say, "get the doctor!" because all the questions they ask will be answered by the paper I give them.

If you have a computer, the main way you can enter data is with a disk or by typing on the keyboard. A scanner gives you another way to enter data in this digital age. This is an important class that helps you be prepared for emergencies, illness, and even death. **Be prepared! Monday, November 3rd, at 1pm - Memories and Magic!**

iOS 8 and 8.1 – My Experience

I am not happy with the new iOS 8. Last year, when we had a major upgrade to iOS 7, I was able upload it on 3 devices and it worked flawlessly from day one. Not so with iOS 8.

First the uploading did not go smoothly, requiring several reboots to get it running. Then I started noticing web sites that weren't opening as quickly and the screen would freeze with no response to any touching. I have always relied on rebooting to solve problems, so I tried that. The expected Apple icon appeared for about 60 sec as usual, but instead of the opening screen appearing, everything went dark ... and dead. So I rebooted again, and again, and again. Finally after the 4th reboot, I had a live device.

When Apple announced the release of iOS 8.1 to fix various bugs, I hoped this would fix my problem. It didn't happen. I am typing this on my iPad mini after uploading 8.1 and then rebooting 5 times to finally get it working. I don't know if it has fixed the frozen screen problem but I guess I am going have to visit the "Genius" bar at the Apple Store. Wish me luck.

Kretchmar's Korner

Free Email Providers

There are three major free email providers available today, Yahoo Mail by Yahoo, Hotmail by Microsoft, and Gmail by Google. As with many “free” services available on the Internet, the price you pay is the advertising that attempts to attract your attention as you’re reading your mail.

AOL email was the principal email provider 1990s, but is currently in fourth place among free email providers. Many people are comfortable with AOL mail, and if it is still working for you, that’s great.

Some club members are having issues with AOL; mostly because AOL email accounts tend to be targets for unwanted email.

I maintain email accounts with all of the “Big Three” providers. All 3 providers provide plenty on online storage. Which email provider is best? Like the answer to so many computer related questions, it depends. As a minimum I would suggest each user needs two email accounts, one for email you might want and one for trash. The trash account is useful when you are trying to access some online resource where an email address is required. Providing your trash email address helps insure your “real” email account will not be receiving any unexpected mail.

Yahoo Mail is currently the largest (in number of users) in the United States, with twice as many visitors as Hotmail and Gmail combined. However it is losing market share. If you use Yahoo as a homepage Yahoo mail is a natural choice. It is easy to use and is the longest established of the Big Three free providers.

Windows Live Mail (Ed. Note – I believe Dave is actually referring to Microsoft’s Outlook.com e-mail service - TB), formerly named Hotmail, is sponsored by Microsoft. It is integrated with One Drive, an excellent free storage and sharing point for documents, pictures and short videos, among other features. Windows Live Mail provides a relatively smooth transfer from Outlook Express, which was discontinued with Microsoft’s Windows XP operating system.

Gmail from Google is the smallest but fastest growing email provider. Gmail has become my favorite partly because Gmail is integrated with outstanding Google applications, such as YouTube, and Google is constantly adding new features.

Cox and CenturyLink, as well as being Summerlin's principal Internet Service Providers (ISP), also provide email service at *no additional charge*. You can directly use their email services or link Microsoft Outlook or Outlook Express to Cox or CenturyLink mail servers.

If you have a Cox or CenturyLink email address it is easy to configure your account so that all email sent to your address is automatically forwarded to Yahoo, Hotmail, or Gmail.

The most obvious disadvantage in using ISP based email accounts is if you change ISPs, you must transfer your account. These providers can change names, i.e. Embarq/CenturyLink, which might someday require an account change

If you have more questions about email, consider attending one of the classes offered by the computer club.
