- What is a fax
 - Fax is short for facsimile which is a true copy of a document.
- Why fax from your computer
 - Since a fax is sent over a telephone line, it is safer than putting sensitive material in your mailbox or transmitting via a non-secure website.
 - o It's cheaper than postage for one or two pages!
 - It's way cheaper than taking your documents to a local store that charges for faxing!
 - Most faxing programs inform the sender that the fax was successfully sent.
 - Most legal entities will not accept email instructions. A handwritten signature can be faxed. Some institutions accept signature via fax.
- What equipment is necessary
 - o A modem (separate card or on motherboard)
 - o A connection to a telephone line
- Programs to be demonstrated today ("If you can print it, you can fax it!"):
 - O Windows Fax
 - Comes with Windows XP Pro and Home, Windows Vista Business, Ultimate and Enterprise versions.

 - Configure
 - Add dial prefix (if necessary) to number or check box to use dialing rules
 - Send
 - Send to multiple recipients
 - Receive (not to be demoed)

 - Add any special dialing rules (if necessary) in Preferences | Sending | Item 9 (dialing rules)
 - Send to one recipient
 - Receive (not to be demoed)
- "Bells and whistles" more advanced operations
 - o Place signatures or pictures on a document to be faxed
 - Fill out PDF forms and then fax them, even if you can't save them
